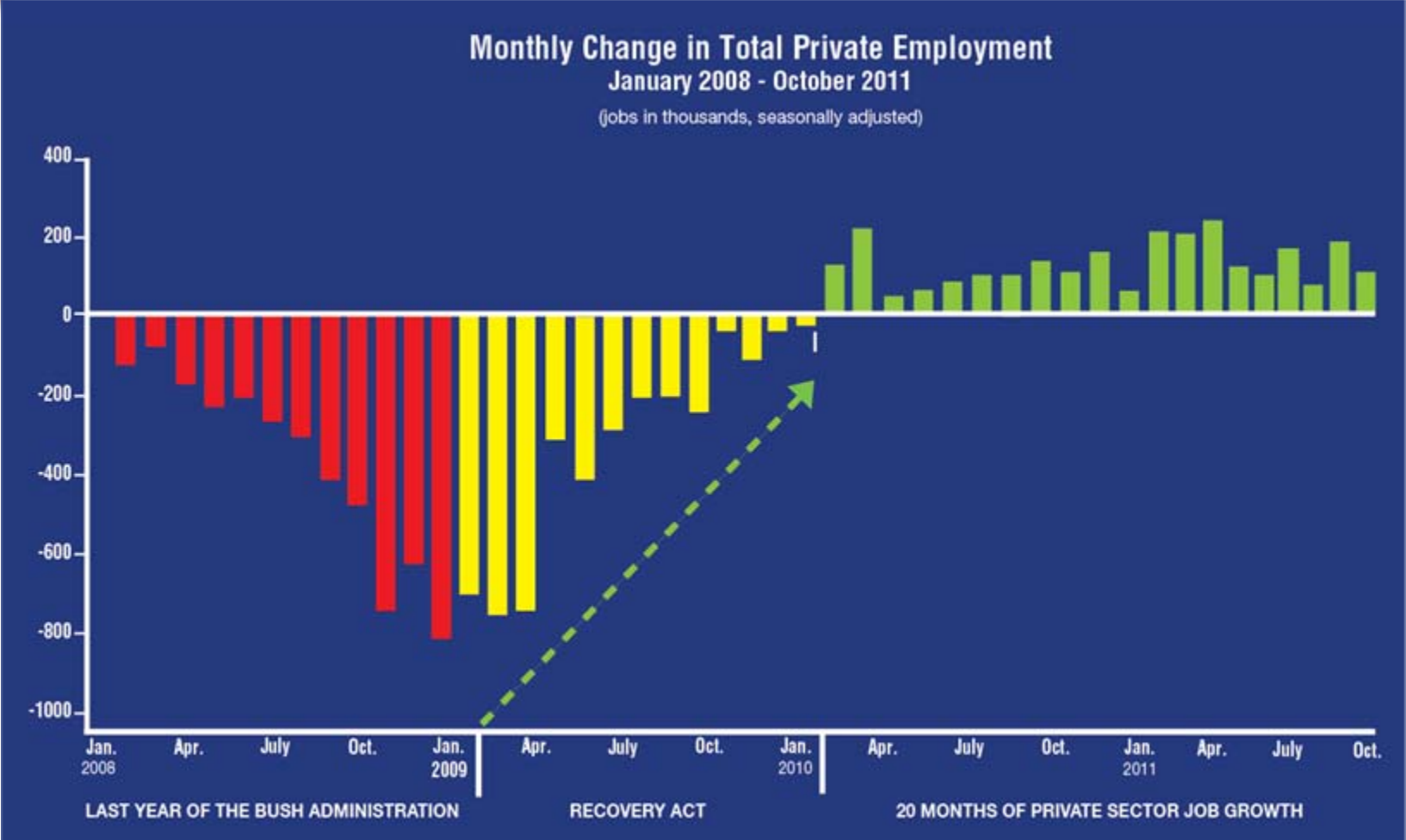

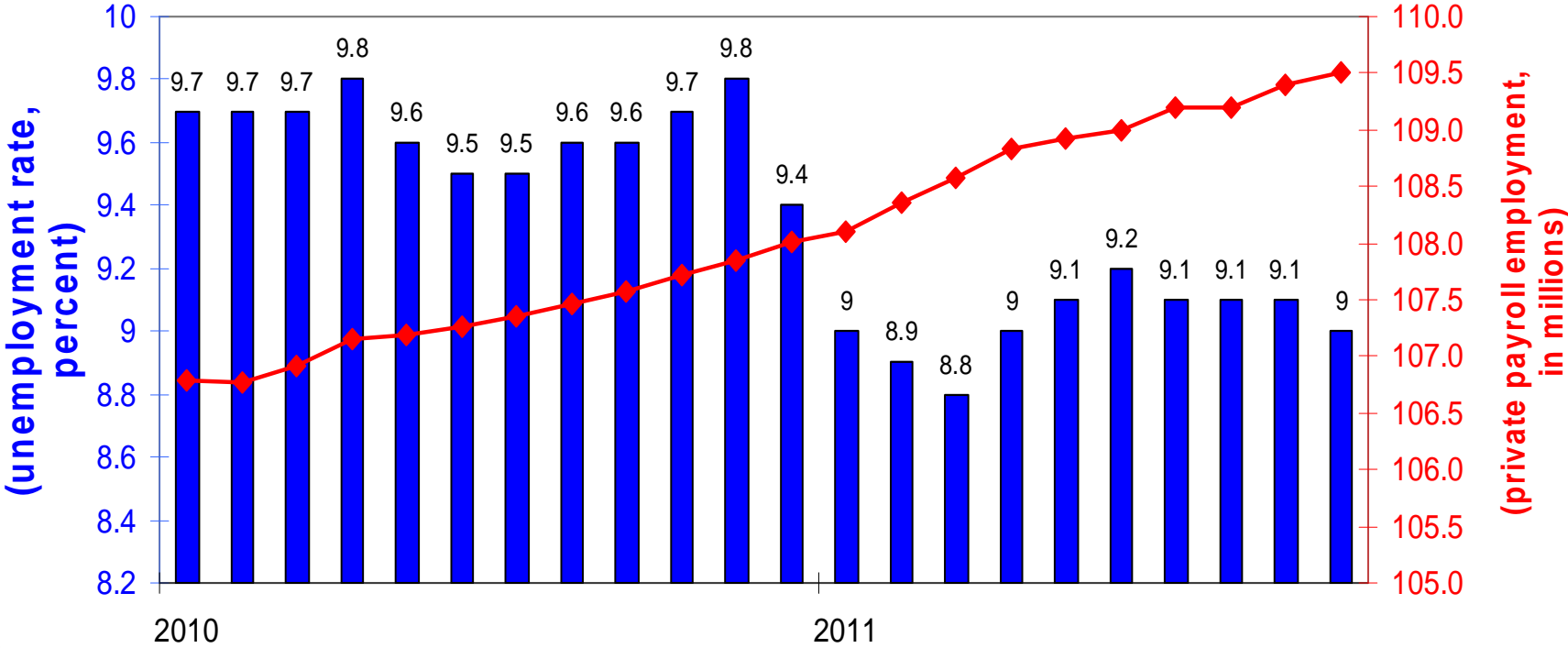

Job Growth and Unemployment

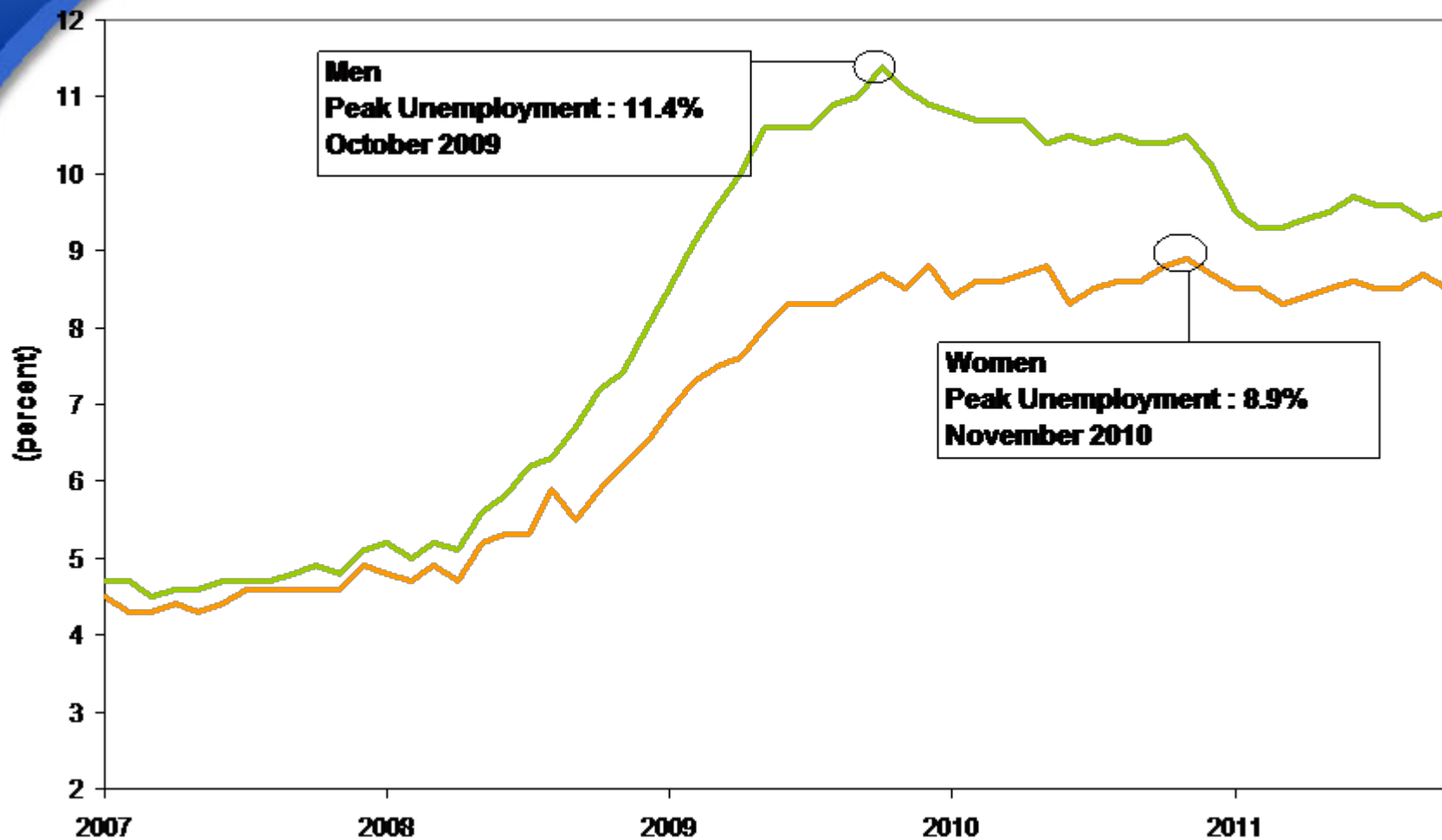
Unemployment and Job Growth since Jan 2010

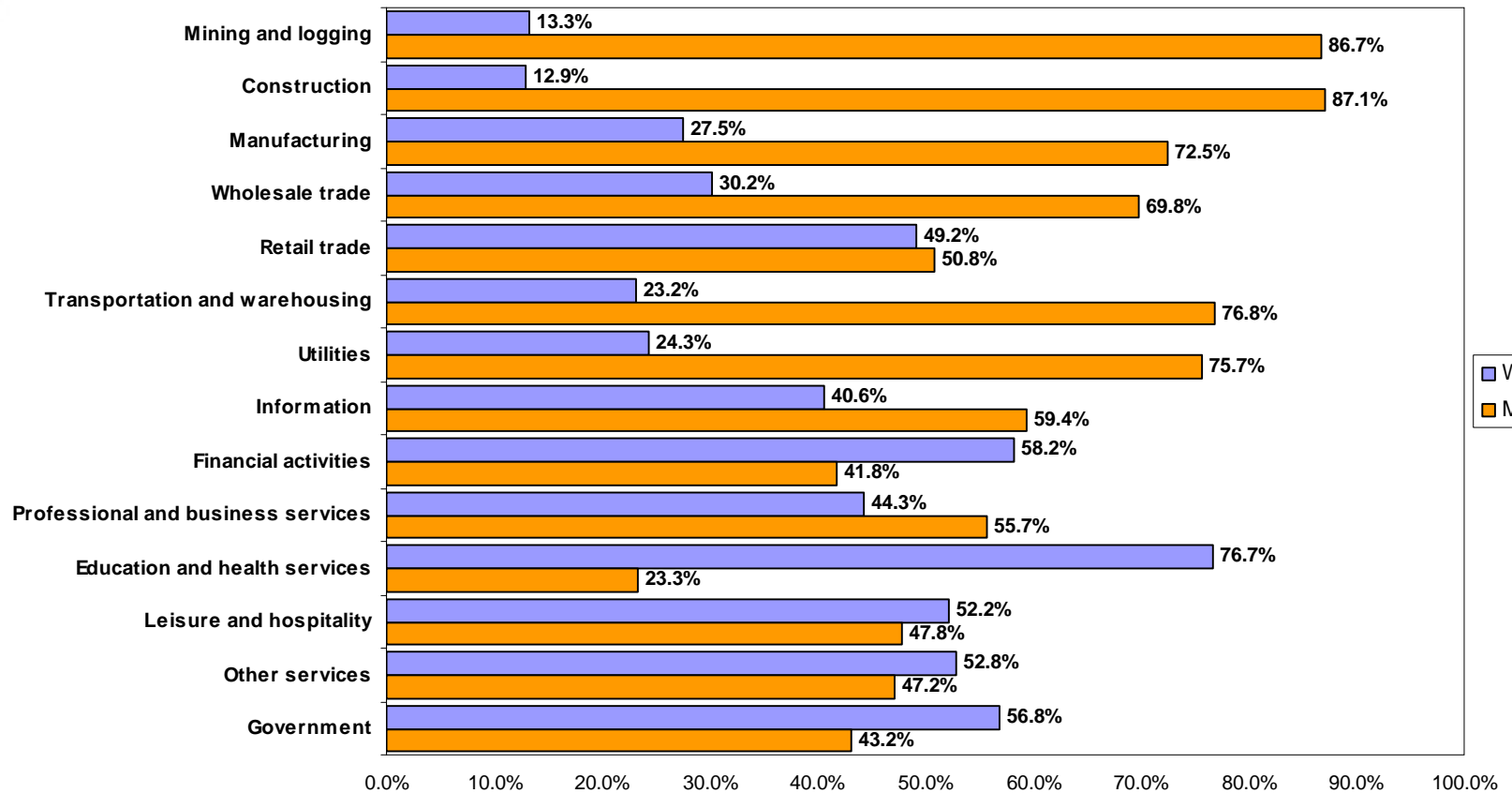
Unemployment rate for Men and Women (Seasonally adjusted, monthly data, ages 16 and older, Jan 2007 - Oct 2011)

Share of Men and Women in Selected Industries

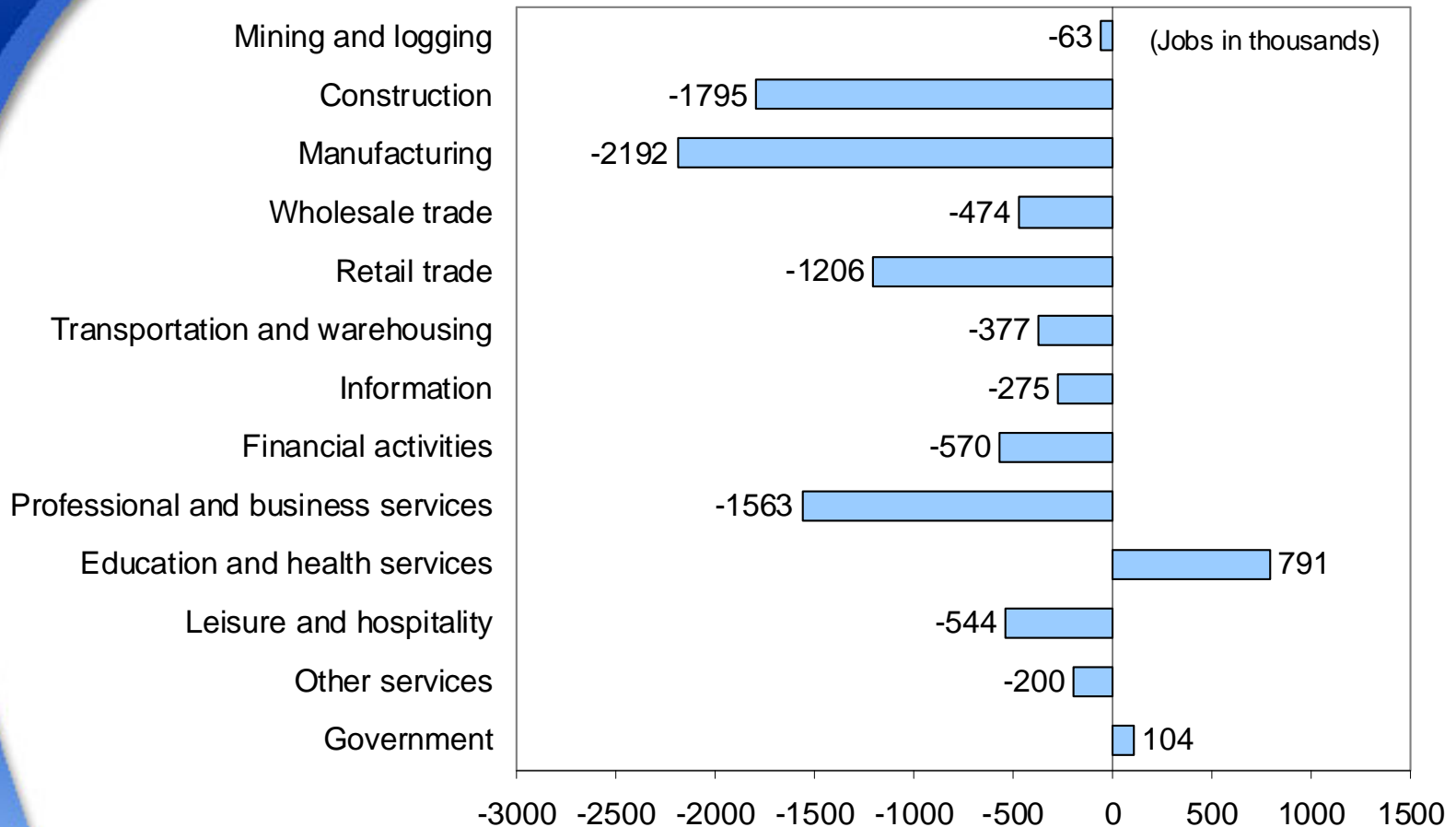

Change in payroll employment from Dec. 2007 to Dec. 2009



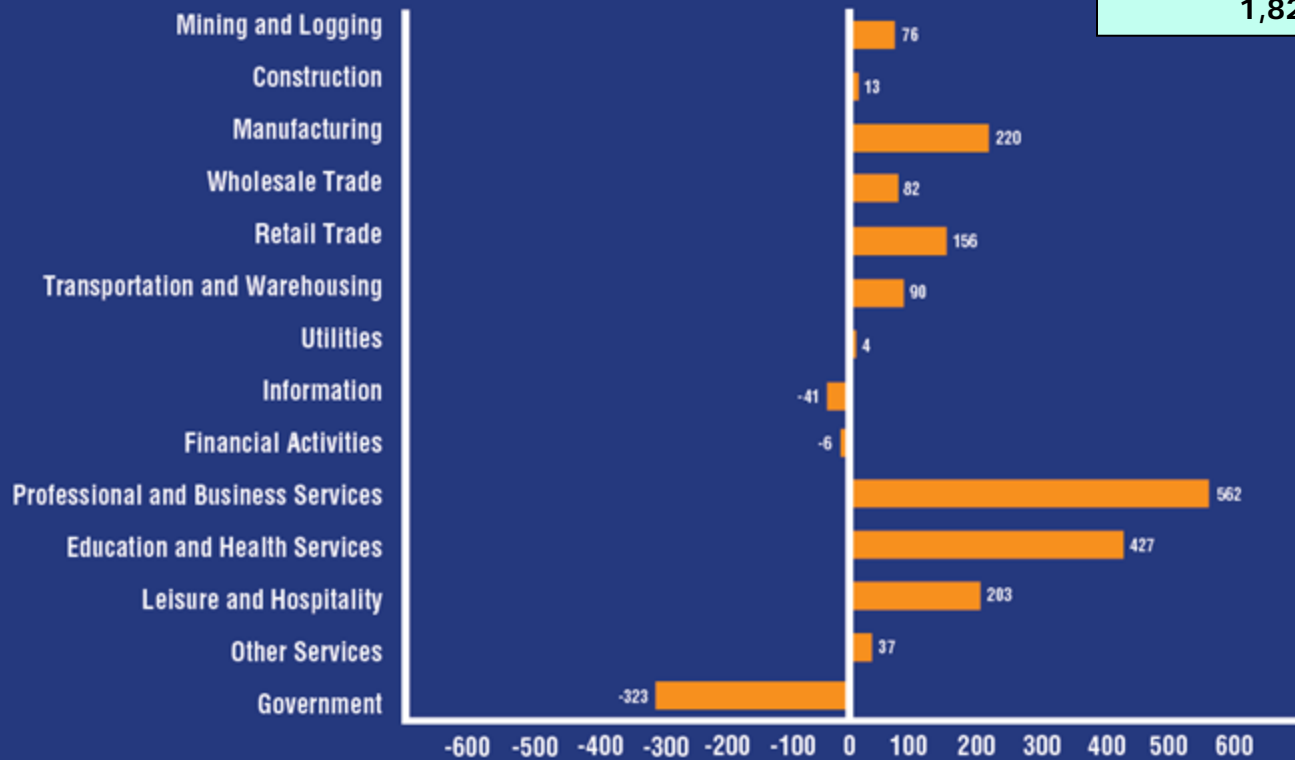

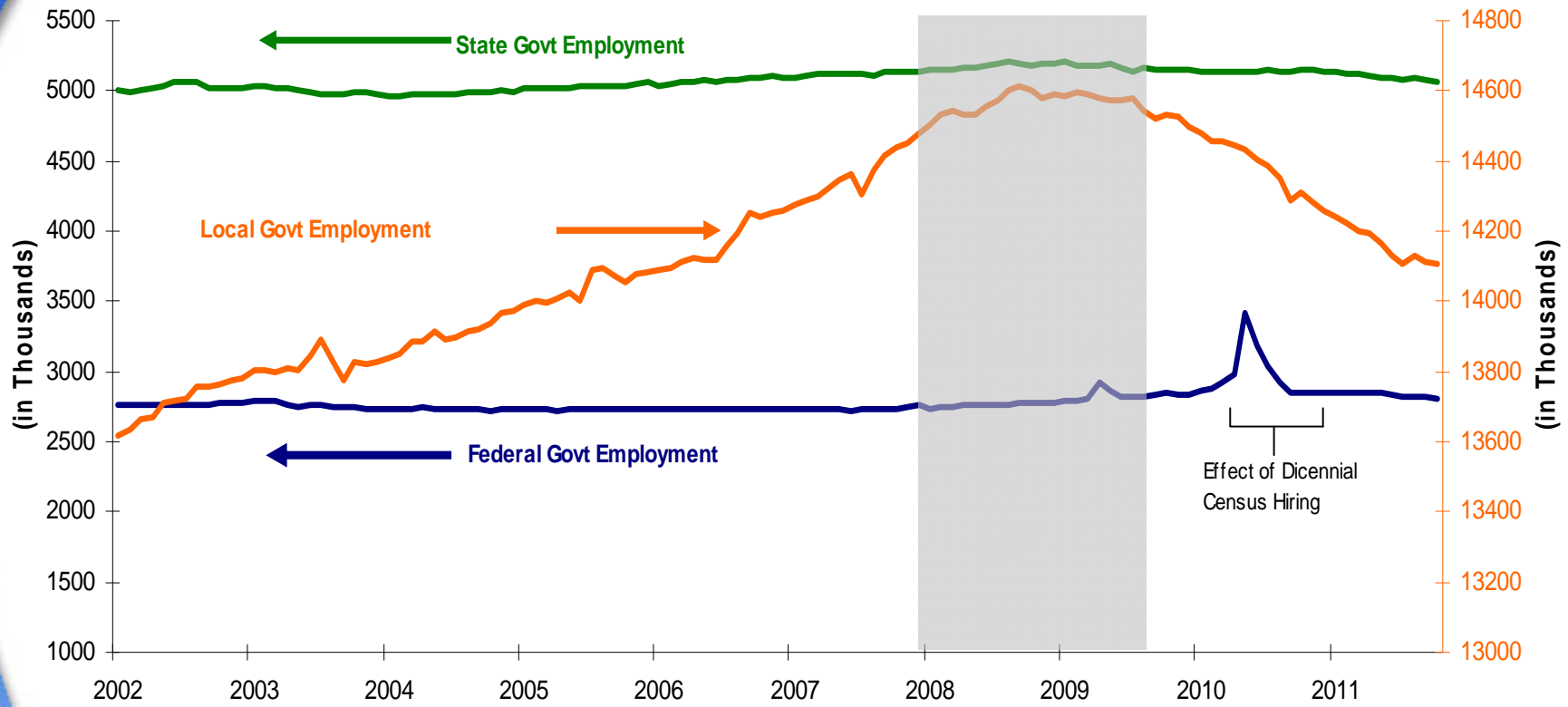

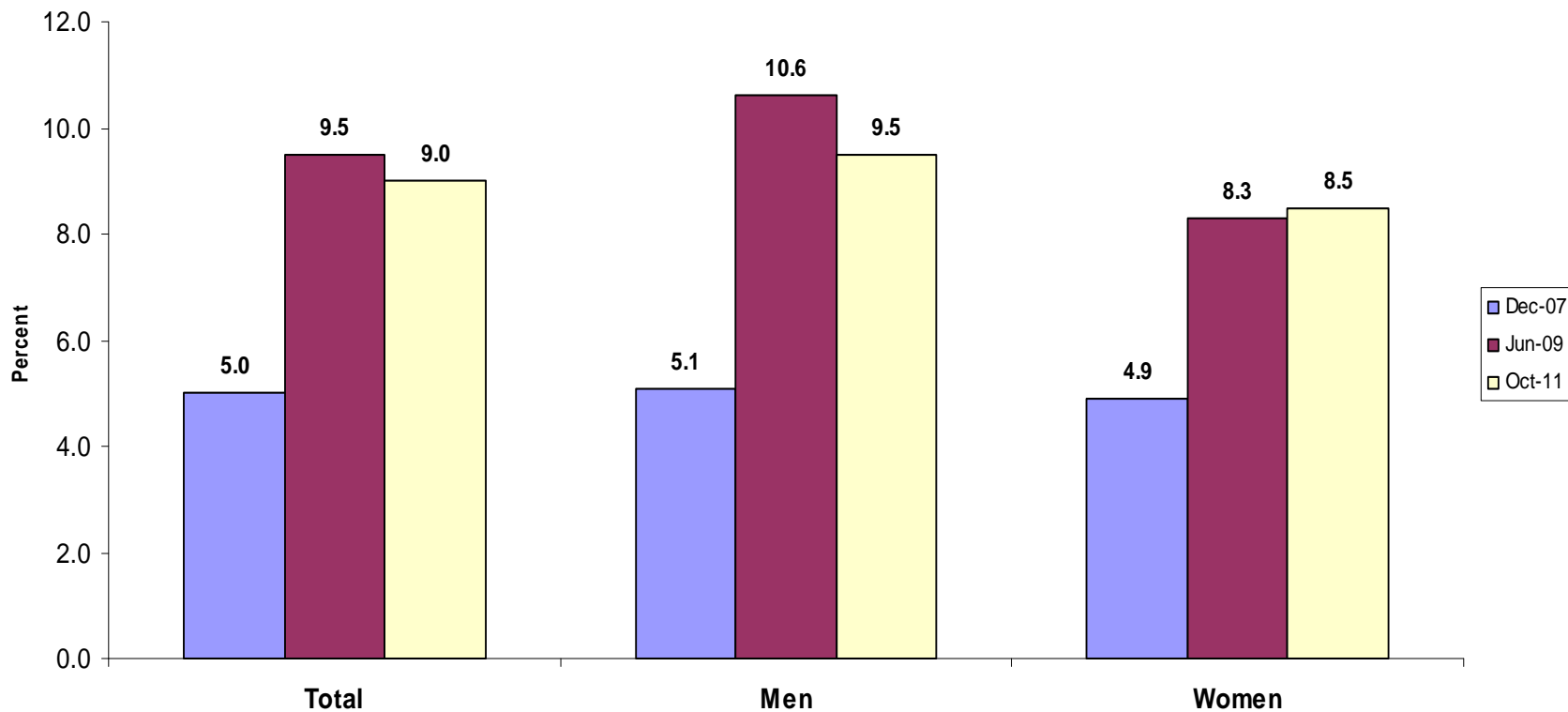
Employment Trends in Federal, State and Local Government Since 2002

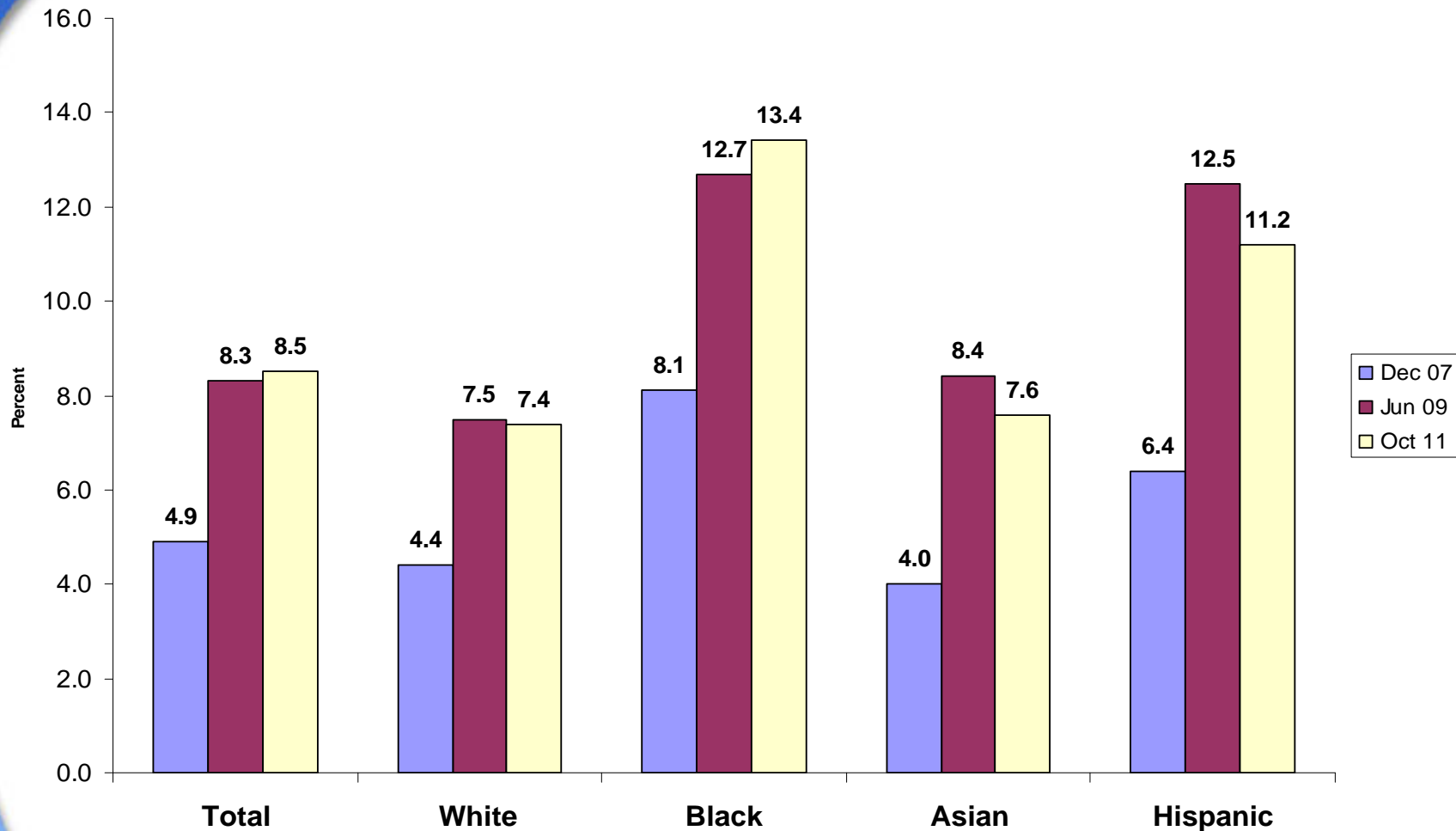
Unemployment by Sex

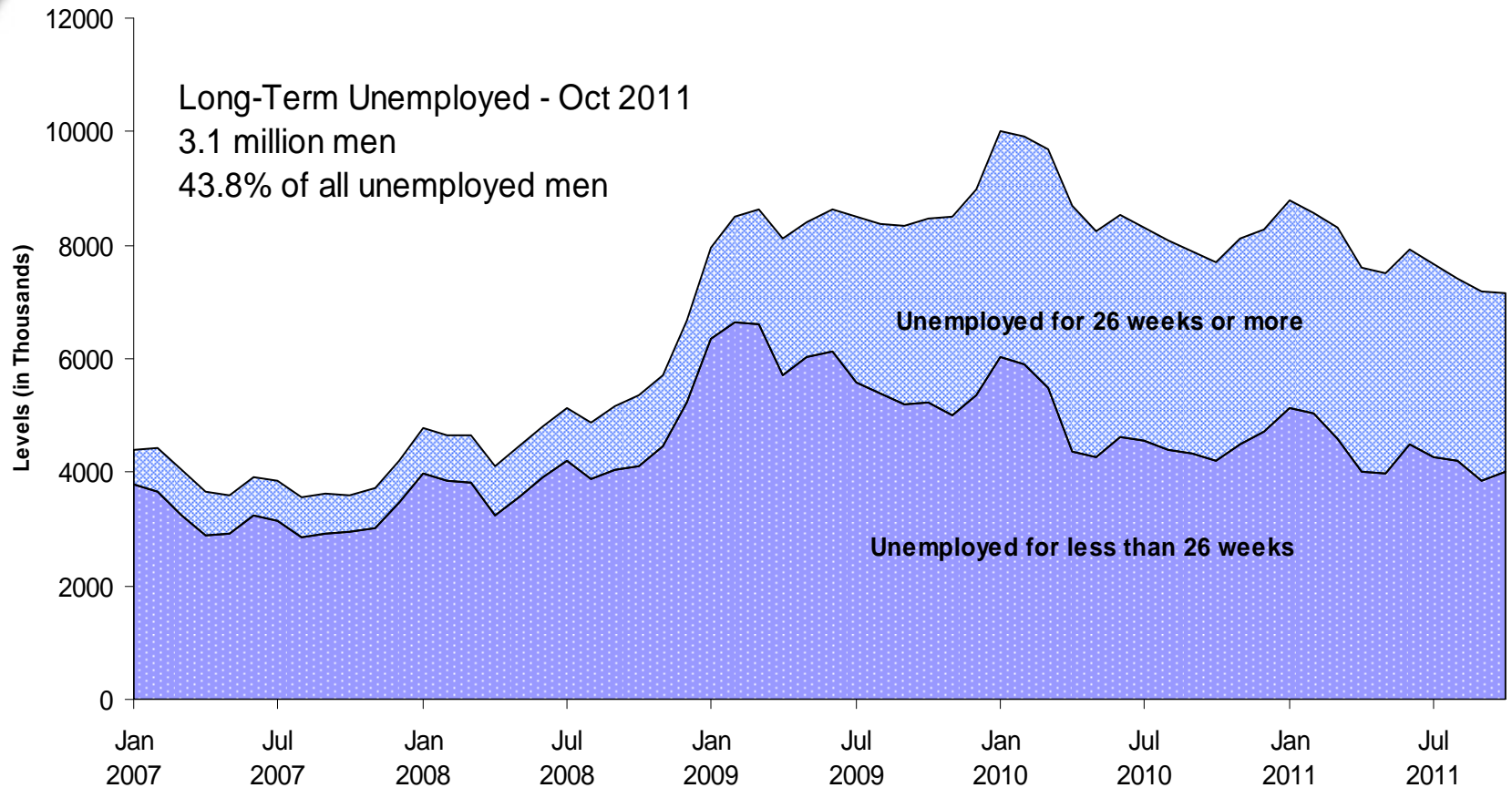
Unemployment for Women by Race and Ethnicity

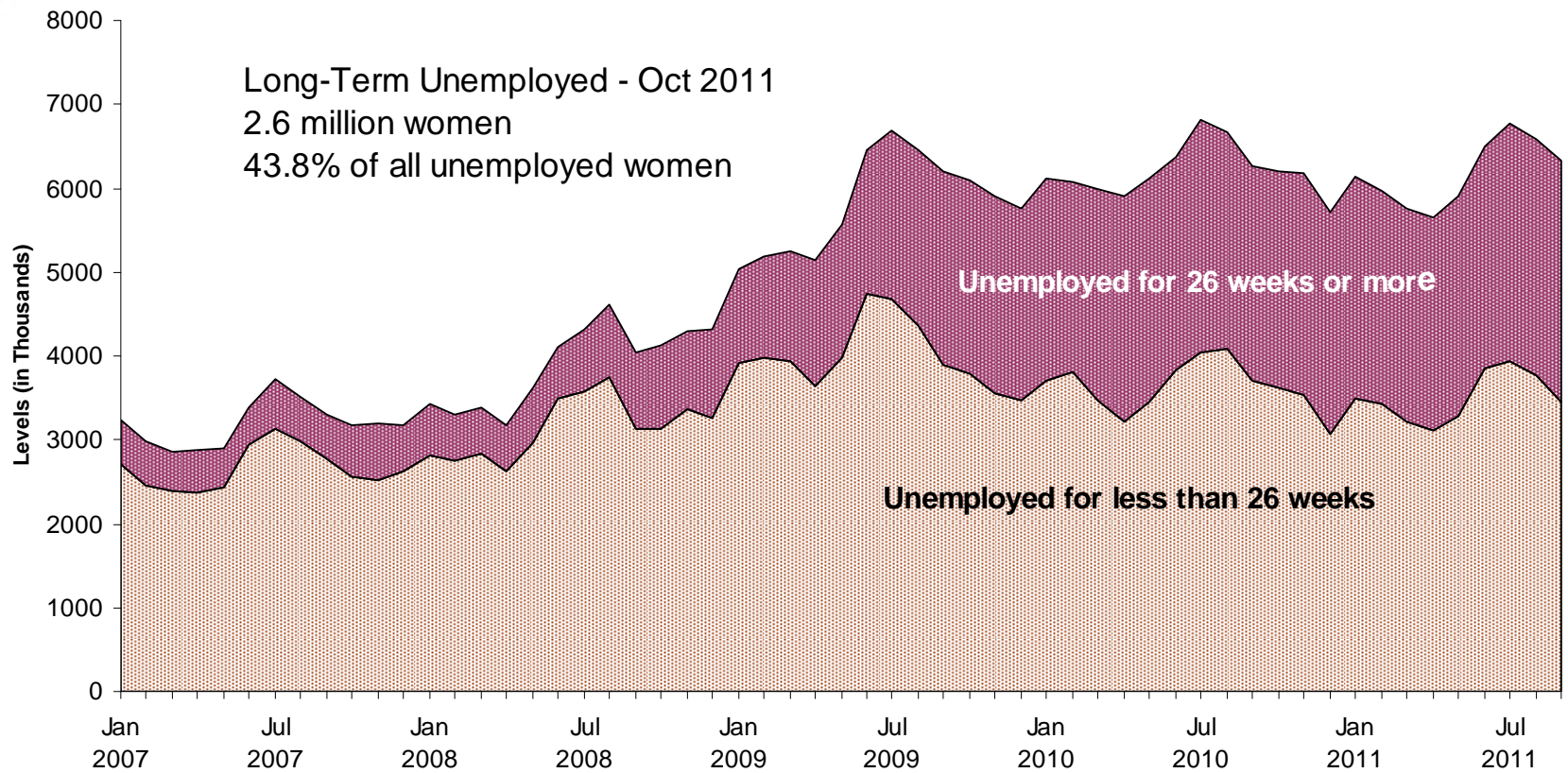
Incidence of Long-Term Unemployment for Men

Incidence of Long-Term Unemployment for Women



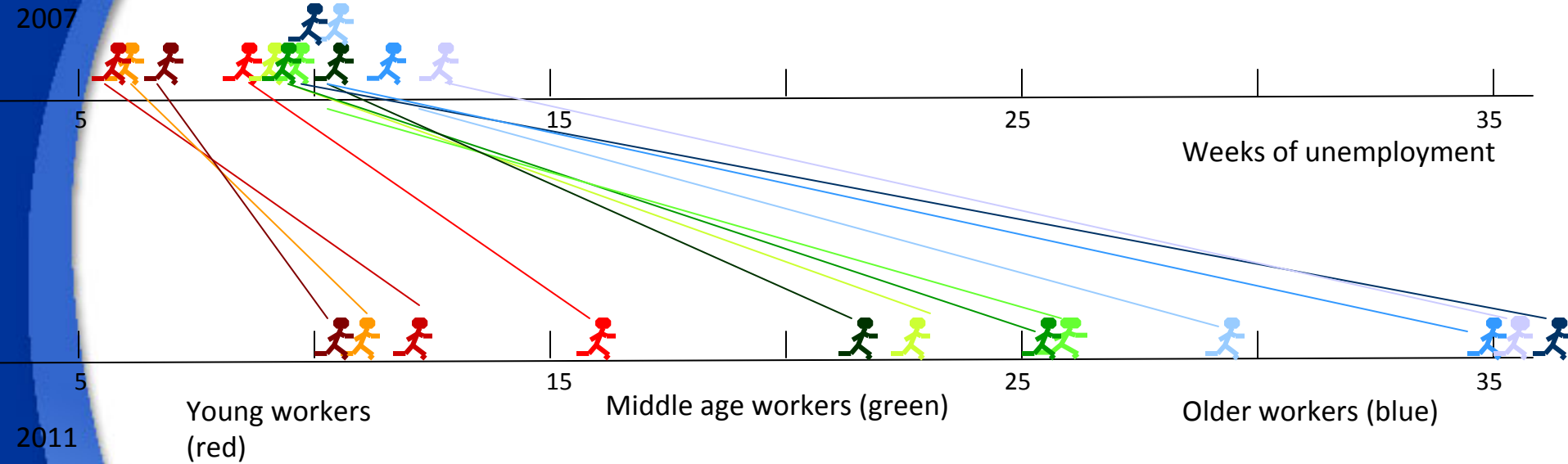

Red 16-24 years old; Green workers 25-54 years old; Blue workers ages 55 and over.

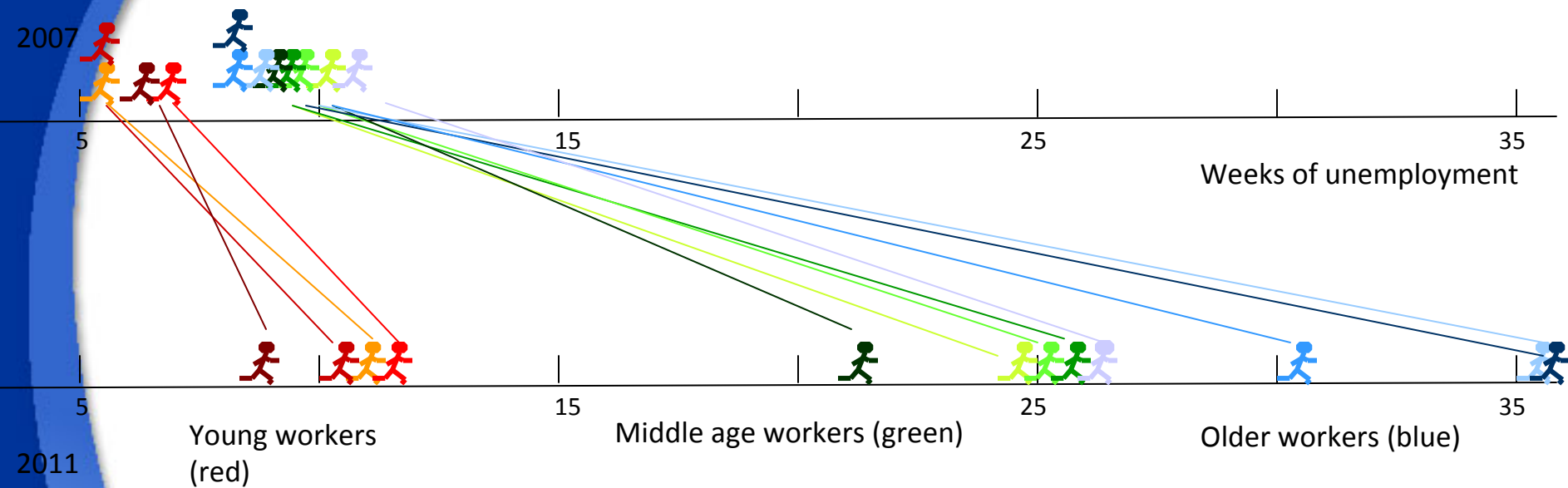
Darker shades represent higher education.

Median duration of unemployment in weeks among women, by age and education 2007 and 2011

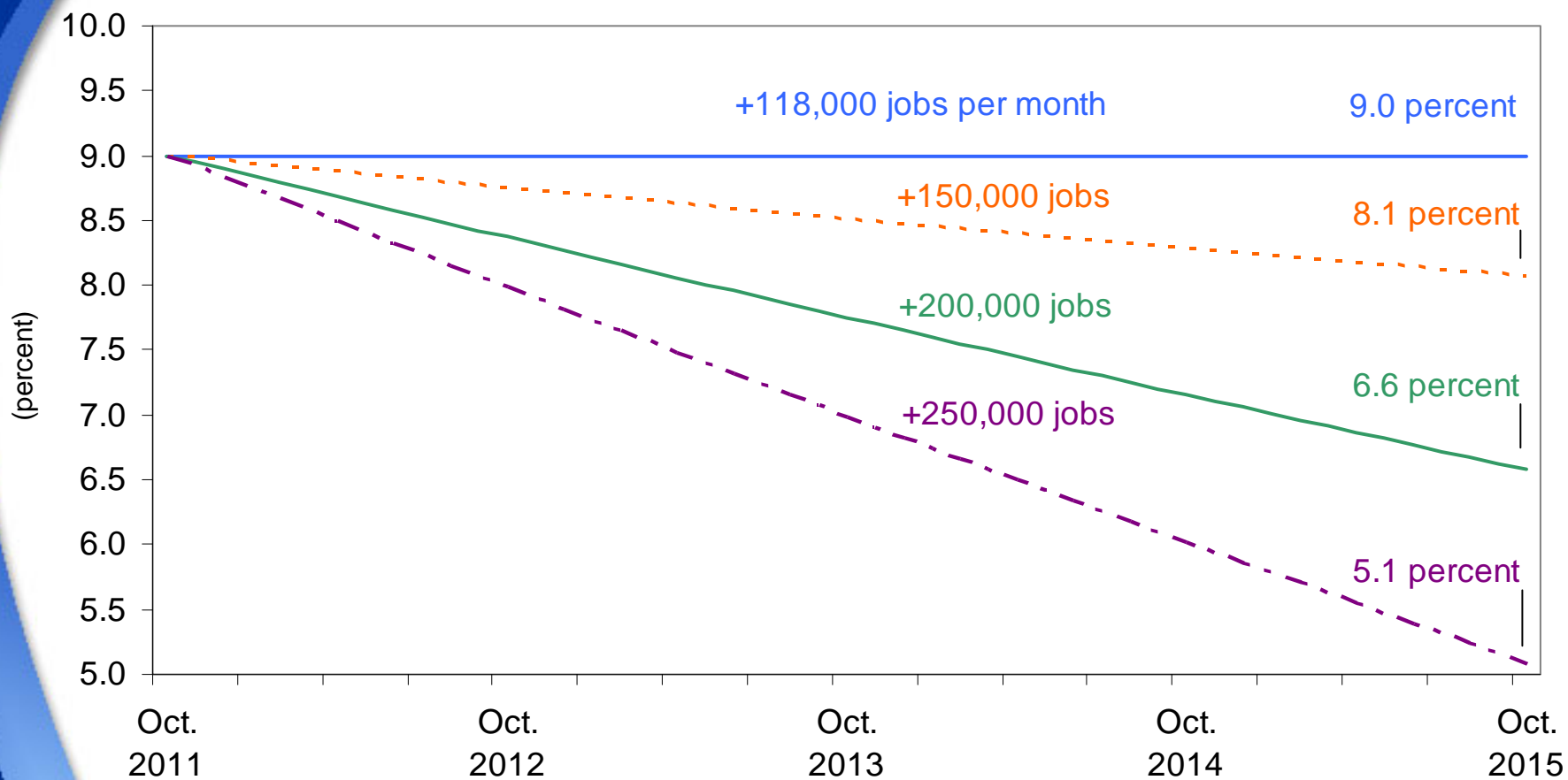


Red 16-24 years old; Green workers 25-54 years old; Blue workers ages 55 and over.

American Jobs Act's Impact on Women

- **An extension of unemployment insurance that will prevent 2.6 million women from losing their benefits**
 - Extension of Self Employment Assistance Program – allows use of unemployment benefits to start-up a new business.
- **Over 75 million women will benefit from the extension of the payroll tax cut for workers.**
- **Payroll tax cut for small employers will benefit 900,000 women-owned small businesses.**
- **\$30 million will prevent layoffs of firefighters, police and teachers including up to 280,000 teacher lay-offs**
 - 78% of teachers in Pre K – 12th grade are women
